Dear Governor Kathy Hochul, Senate Majority Leader Stewart-Cousins, Speaker Heastie, Senator Kavanagh, Senator Krueger, Assemblymember Pretlow, and Assemblymember Rosenthal:

We are grateful that the Governor and both Houses have maintained funding in the Executive Budget and One-House Resolutions for Community Land Trusts (CLTs)—including **\$1.5M in the Community Controlled Affordable Housing fund (CCAH) and \$1M in the CLT Support Program fund.**

At a time when New York is facing a deepening affordable housing crisis—marked by rising rents, evictions and accelerating displacement—CLTs offer one of the most effective tools to keep housing permanently affordable and address root causes of homelessness and displacement. CLTs and our allies organize for deeply and permanently affordable housing, commercial and community spaces, and other neighborhood-led development.

For that reason, we urge you to increase funding in the FY2027 budget to \$2.5M for the CLT Support Program and \$5M for the Community Controlled Affordable Housing Fund.

These two funds remain the only dedicated state resources supporting the infrastructure of the growing CLT movement, even as demand for deeply and permanently affordable housing continues to expand across New York.

This funding is essential to stabilize neighborhoods and combat displacement of low-income and Black and brown New Yorkers. We appreciate the Governor and the Legislature's ongoing leadership in uplifting community-driven solutions like ours to the housing crisis. Increased funding would help our organizations scale up our capacity to bring more homes, greenspaces, and other properties into permanent affordability and community control.

Across the state, CLTs are organizing residents, acquiring buildings, and bringing land and housing into permanently affordable community control. Existing state funding is already producing transformative results:

- **Western Queens CLT** used funding from both programs to organize community members around vacant lots and to support the acquisition of its first property: a community food pantry with two adjoining units of housing.
- **East Harlem El Barrio Community Land Trust** received funding from both programs to support predevelopment work for five buildings representing 143 units of permanently affordable housing; and for board and staff development, resident engagement, and basebuilding.
- In Brooklyn, **East New York CLT** used CCAH to cover pre-development costs that led to the acquisition of a neglected 20-unit building, the residents of which are now working with the CLT to rehabilitate and convert the building to an HDFC cooperative.

- The **Bronx CLT** used funding from the CLT Support Program to conduct resident education and board development with tenants in two multifamily buildings transitioning on to the CLT.

An increase to \$7.5M in total state funding would prove catalytic, equipping the more than 30 existing CLTs statewide with the resources needed to prepare acquisitions, revitalize buildings, and create affordable and accessible community spaces—keeping more families in their homes and building lasting wealth and stability in redlined and disinvested communities across the state.

We appreciate your leadership and urge you to work with us to secure deeper levels of funding in this year's budget.
